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Lloyd A. Fry Foundation Supports New Tri-Agency Collaborative Project Aimed at Improving Evaluation Practices in Children's Counseling Programs

CHICAGO (June 9, 2011) - The Lloyd A. Fry Foundation has awarded a two-year grant of over \$100,000 to the Tri-Agency Collaborative, a joint project between Children's Home + Aid, Lutheran Social Services of Illinois, and the YWCA of Metropolitan Chicago, to help the agencies improve evaluation practices in counseling programs for children in Chicago. With the support of the Lloyd A. Fry Foundation, the Tri-Agency Collaborative is seeking to improve programmatic outcomes, measurement and evaluation of mental health programs run by the participating agencies.

Evaluating the success of mental health programs for children in community and school-based settings has historically been a challenge for social service providers, due to limited resources and obstacles related to accurately capturing the impact of counseling services on children. "Counseling services are inherently personal, individualized and subjective, making it hard to show the impact on children in an objective way" said Anne Barclay, Vice President of Clinical and Community Services at Children's Home + Aid. Sharing this common challenge, the members of the Tri-Agency Collaborative came together to try to find solutions they could share among themselves and other social service providers to improve the quality of services for Chicago's most vulnerable children.

Implementing appropriate outcomes measures, measurement tools and benchmarks requires a significant investment of resources – a significant challenge for agencies already facing reductions in funding for children's mental health services. "Foundations, corporations, and public agencies increasingly want to see measures of how effective and cost efficient mental health services are in order to provide or continue funding," said Dr. Stephen Budde of the Juvenile Protective Association, the consultant for the project selected by the Tri-Agency Collaborative, "paradoxically, these same organizations are largely uninterested in funding the work necessary to produce meaningful outcome measures. The Lloyd A. Fry Foundation had the foresight to provide financial support to a group of committed providers to help them build organizational capacity, through collaboration and consultation, to more thoughtfully and rigorously evaluate their programs."

"We are excited to support the Tri-Agency Collaborative as they seek to address systematic barriers that have been a hindrance to our mental health program grantees for many years," says Unmi Song, Executive Director of the Lloyd A. Fry Foundation, "we hope that this dynamic partnership will have a significant impact on the way metal health providers evaluate their services, so that Chicago's children can benefit from the most effective, highest quality mental health services possible." The Tri-Agency Collaborative is confident that this significant investment from the Lloyd A. Fry Foundation will help them achieve these goals.
